Old Business

Medic One Proposal

- Chief Lipe's memo, the ALS and BLS proposals both chiefs worked on with Jim
 Fogarty are in the packet. The chiefs would like to know if the Board has questions.
 A/C Brown will answer what questions he can and convey others to Jim Fogarty. A
 Special Meeting can be scheduled next week with Jim Fogarty to answer more
 questions.
- Question: Who will benefit from the transition of Vashon paramedics back into the county-wide Medic One rotating system? It would benefit the public community and visitors by having two medics providing transport during the first ALS call received.
- Mr. Palmer answered that paramedics see this as a natural evolution which started on the island with only two paramedics providing 24/7 care, but unlike the rest of the system we're only able to transport with one medic. Director Fogarty said their study showed patient outcomes were worse with a one medic transport, so they stopped doing it throughout the rest of the system, but allowed it for Vashon due to paramedics' out-of-service time with ferry transports to hospitals. He sees it as an improvement.
- Mr. Hauge differs in his personal opinion. When he worked for Seattle it was busy. When he was hired here, he had to learn to work alone, but with his personality he liked working that way and felt it worked well. When there are two ALS calls going on at the same time it was exciting, challenging and he has seen others work well under those conditions. He also likes firefighting on Vashon. He would only get to perform a single assignment on a fire in Seattle but here he has the opportunity to perform multiple tasks and he would much prefer to stay here. He also worries about lapse of care taking two medies off at once.
- Question: How are all the medics feeling about this change? Mr. Palmer replied that generally everyone is in agreement because off island rotating (through stations and partners) is the system everyone is used to before coming to Vashon. Paramedics came here because they wanted to be here, but their skills are not as sharp. Some of it is due to lack of "muscle memory." For instance, he's seen two gunshot wounds in 10 years on Vashon, but saw that many a week at Shoreline. He was an EMT-P when he started but patient care did not offer the same outcome that the two paramedic responses provide. In Seattle or Shoreline you would resuscitate 6-12 patients a month, which more than he's seen in 10 years on the island.
- Vashon pays \$700,000 into the EMS levy while King County subsides Vashon's program with 2.1 million dollars.
- We enjoy a 63% CPR survival rate in King County.
- Question: Will Vashon would see a service reduction? It was pointed out that the Fire District is responsible for fire suppression and Basic Life Support (BLS). King County Medic One is responsible for Advanced Life Support (ALS) response it is their program.

- Question: Is it a compromise to have two paramedics in a "box" (aid car) vs. two paramedics in their separate rigs? There are so many obstacles when we're "at sea" considering ferries, tides, helicopter runs, etc.
- This transition may lead to a lack of firefighters since many Medic One paramedics are not firefighters. King County medics do respond to fires but for firefighter rehab; suppression is not their duty. Even now if our paramedics are on a fire, one has to rotate out. If an ALS call happens, we have to have the paramedic out (of the fire zone) within 10 minutes. If a fire is going on, Medic One paramedics could go on a BLS call if our people are involved in fire suppression.
- As soon as the two medics determined they need to transport, they can request a
 Medical Services Officer (MSO) to come to the island (if one is not already on duty).
 That MSO would respond, as a single paramedic with EMTs, to a second call just like
 we do now. We can also call for an MSO to come over if we have a structure fire.
- It would give us more depth of staffing because with a paramedic out on an injury, like we currently have, the overtime is concerning because our medics are working 5-6 shifts/days to cover. Because of those needs, we have to deny vacations, etc.
- At this time we do not have exact dollars or dates for the paramedic transition; the proposal is general. But this proposed transition would address the concerns that B/C Mark Brownell and Dr. Sam Warren voiced in their letter. It was suggested either a 60-day, 90-day or one year test period be implemented. Mr. Palmer said A/C Brown is right about the patient care but felt the MSO model will not work for very long. A three paramedic model, however, is supported by the people in the system. There is not that big a gap between the proposal and what they believe is best. Fire chief is relatively excited about it.
- If 2.1 million dollars is taken out of our budget, our levy may not be enough to run our administrative services.
- Mr. Palmer stated he is preparing the labor group here in order take over the labor union.
- Question: What is the rank of an MSO? Throughout the Medic One system the title of MSO covers a range of ranks: Lieutenant, Captain and in South King County, a Battalion Chief. There are field supervisors and training supervisors on day shifts so there are various jobs throughout the system, but they are all practicing paramedics (or have been) first.
- Three months ago, VIFR called a private ambulance to come over and transport a BLS patient when we had a number of calls and transports going on.
- There was Board consensus to hold a Special Meeting on August 19. Director Jim
 Fogarty will be there and the Board said they would like to hear from other
 paramedics what their thoughts and feelings are about the issue. A/C Brown stated
 the schedule target would be to finalize the transition plan by the end of the month for
 the transition to take place the first of the year (2015). This will be an open, public
 meeting.
